Yet the trade-off between immediate financial return and the long-term goal of gender equality is acute, and feminists fear "pink-washing" of initiatives that fail to challenge inequality at a systematic level. On any given day, the world produces 2.5 quadrillion bytes of data. But data on gender equality is still frustratingly hard to come by. The "gender data gap" makes it difficult to create effective policies and gauge the progress of programs and services designed to empower women. Today, women and girls continue to be systematically underrepresented as users and leaders in the tech industry. The tech gender gap produces major disparities in economic opportunity, reproduces biases in new technology, and impoverishes the talent pool for innovation. This panel explores solutions for more meaningful representation of female leaders in technology and the way forward for debiasing innovation and the tech industry. This conversation will also draw a spotlight on bridging gender data gaps.

INTRODUCTION TO NEGOTIATIONS

This interactive workshop will help participants increase their negotiating effectiveness whether negotiating a large multi-stakeholder deal or overcoming conflict with a partner or friend. Research has shown that women find fewer situations negotiable, set lower targets than

their male counterparts, and significantly increase their negotiating outcomes when negotiating on behalf of others. Through this interactive workshop, you will have the opportunity to diagnose your own approach to conflict and practice the foundational skills of interest-based negotiation.

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
